Report of a Trip to

Bali & Lombok

From 16th August to 2nd September 2011

Between 16 August en 2 September 2011 we had a holiday on Bali and Lombok. Main goal was to have a nice and relaxed family holiday, with some occasional birding. The birding was aimed at some species: both the rare starlings of Bali, Javan Banded Pitta on Bali and Ornate (aka Elegant) Pitta and Chestnut-backed Thrush on Lombok. We had booked our international flight with <u>www.cheaptickets.nl</u> and our accommodation was also booked via the internet. We stayed at three places: the first 6 days we stayed at Villa Ayode near Kedungu, on Bali. The second week we stayed at Villa Perac near Senggigi, Lombok and the last 5 days we stayed at Villa Viveka, c 15 km west of Lovina on the northern part of Bali.




Itinerary

- 15 August Flight at 11:00 am from Amsterdam to Singapore with Singapore Airlines.
- 16 August Arrival at Singapore at 5:45, connecting flight at 9:00 hours with Garuda to Denpasar, Bali. Arrived on time at 11:30 hours. Picked up by driver who brought us to our accommodation at Villa Ayode (<u>http://www.villa-ayo.nl/home</u>) near Kedungu (c 15 km from Tanah Lot temple, a famous tourist spot). Rest of the day was spent relaxing. First birds were Javan Pond Heron, Scaly-breasted Munia, Olive-backed Sunbird, Edible-nest Swiftlet and Spotted Dove.
- **17 August** Kedungu. In the afternoon we spent some time at Kedungu Beach where we saw 3 Lesser Frigatebirds and several Greater Crested Terns.
- **18 August** Another day relaxing in our villa. New birds were Bar-winged Prinia and Javan Myna.
- **19 August** Spent whole day at Ubud, a famous tourist trap and few birds seen, but at some hot springs (I forgot the name and location) we saw White-breasted Waterhen and Javan Kingfisher.
- **20 August** Another day relaxing in our villa. I managed to photograph a Javan Kingfisher behind the villa.
- **21 August** We went to one of the waterfalls near Bedugul. We also visited the Botanical Gardens. In the gardens it was quite busy and noisy, so I was not able to do some good birding. Later I learned

the Botanical Garden is one of the best places to see Sunda Thrush. My children Joop and Bob had a wonderful time however, as they did some tree-climbing.

22 August Only relaxing in the morning. At noon we were brought to the airport where we took flight Lion Air JT-1854 to Lombok at 16:10 hours. The flight took only some 30 minutes and we landed on time at 16:40 hours. Tickets were booked at <u>http://ticketindonesia.info/</u>. At Mataram we were picked-up by a taxi that brought us to Senggigi, where we stayed at Kampong Duduk in Villa Perac (<u>http://www.villalombok.nl/</u>). First birds were Indonesian Honeyeaters and Whitebreasted Woodswallows. Dinner in the evening at Yessy's Café.



23 August Spent day relaxing at the villa and later in the afternoon we took a short walk to the sea shore.

- 24 August Again we only relaxed at our villa and in the afternoon we went to a restaurant just north of the villa. Our housekeeper Noeng helped us to arrange two daytrips, one to the Nanggu Islands with us all and one to the lower slopes of Mount Rinjani. During the night I heard an owl-like sound and I developed allergy on my torso. Had dinner again in Yessy's Café.
- **25 August** Noeng's cousin Alyn from <u>www.lombok-lintrack.com</u> took us to the Nanggu Islands, where we did some excellent snorkeling with amazing fish and we had a wonderful lunch on one of the islands. Best birds were Collared Kingfisher, White-breasted Waterhen, Pale-headed Munia and a Short-toed Snake Eagle later in the afternoon at the villa. My allergy worsened, so we bought some anti-histamine at an *apotek*, but that was not working yet.
- 26 August At 4:00 hours I was picked-up by Alyn and the driver and they took me to the Gunung Rinjani NP. Alyn arranged all permits to the National Park and has a license to guide people all along the summit. I had arranged only go to Pos II at c 1500 m. We start walking just after sunrise and the first part we had the trail for ourselves. Best birds between the entrance and Pos Between

were Scaly-crowned Honeyeater, Lemon-bellied White-eye, Blue-cheeked Flowerpecker, Whiteshouldered Triller, White-rumped Kingfisher, Lesser Shortwing, Mangrove Whistler and Rustybreasted Cuckoo. At Pos Between the trail became more crowded as trekking groups were ascending, while other groups were descending. As the trail to Pos II became steeper en more crowded, Alyn and I decided to descend slowly and pull our luck at several stops, During the descend we heard a Metallic Pigeon, several Helmeted Friarbirds (seen badly, heard well) and Black-naped Monarch. Just before Pos I a flushed a bird with no tail, dark green above, red undertail coverts and white bases on the primaries: an Ornate Pitta! We stayed for an hour more, hoping the bird would return, but a Chestnut-backed Thrush appeared and gave a wonderful performance! Other birds seen during descend were Mountain Leaf Warbler and a pair of Scarlet Minivets. At around 14:00 hours we were back at the car again and after a twohour drive we were back at Senggigi. During the ride my allergy worsened and Alyn and Noeng were so kind to arrange an appointment with a doctor. I visited Doctor Aang in Senggigi in the evening and he gave me better anti-histamine pills and powder to stop the itching. Later in the evening we had dinner in the excellent restaurant Square. During the night my allergy became more bearable.

- **27 August** Last full day at Villa Perac. I saw several Lemon-bellied White-eyes in the garden and spent time to photograph Pale-headed Munia (no luck) and Javan Munia. In the evening I managed to record the mystery owl in the palm trees in the garden.
- 28 August At 8:30 we left Villa Perac and headed for the airport to take flight Lion Air JT-1853 at 10:10 hours to Denpasar, Bali. During the trip I had a nice conservation with a Belgium teacher who already had travelled the whole world. We arrived at Denpasar half an hour later. There the taxi of Villa Viveka (<u>http://www.villabalizee.nl/index.html</u>) picked us up. We could only get into the villa after 16:00 hours, so the driver stopped several times to abide the time. First stop was at the beautiful Pura Taman Ayun, where I saw my first Blue-tailed Bee-eaters. Next we had dinner at a restaurant at Danau Bratan. Finally we had a stop at a coffee plantation where we bought Civet Cat Coffee and saw a Leopard Cat in a cage. We arrived at Villa Viveka at 17:00 hours where we also had dinner. Just before the villa we saw our only Yellow Bittern, sitting in a rice field.
- **29 August** Spent day relaxing at our very luxurious villa, where Crested Terns flew above the sea in front of us, and with Long-tailed Shrikes chasing butterflies in the garden. In the evening we had dinner in Lovina in a Dutch-owned restaurant.
- **30 August** In the early morning at 6:00 am we were picked up by a boat and went a few kilometers out in the sea between Seririt and Lovina. We saw several dolphins, but they emerged at unexpected places and some boatmen of other boats were very impatient and steered their boats with full speed where the dolphins submerged. In the end we had some close views, but I wander if the dolphins will take this for long. Rest of the day was spent relaxing (I am on a holiday, remember!). On the roof of the villa I saw my first Pied Stonechat.
- **31 August** At 5:30 am I was picked up by Oswald Huma and Hery Kusumanegara, my guides for the day at Bali Barat. After two hours' drive, we reached the entrance of the park at Labuhan Lalang where we took a boat to the release centre of the Bali Myna. During the crossing we saw Lesser Frigatebird, Little Tern and a group Black-naped Terns. We landed ca 2 km south of the release centre to look for the Black-winged Starling first. Oswald and Hery had seen eight birds on 29 August, but now it was too windy. The Black-winged Starlings like to perch on the treetops, but when there is too much wind they will perch in the sub-canopy. After an hour we finally

managed to see two birds flying two times and in flight I could see all diagnostic features of this much endangered starling. Other birds seen were Savanna Nightjar (resting bird near the shore), Great-billed Heron, Black Drongo, Lesser Minivet, Blue-tailed and Rainbow Bee-eater, Lineated Barbet, Zebra Dove and Crested Serpent-Eagle. At the Bali Myna release centre, we had some trouble finding the last Bali Mynas. Most of the time they stay in the mangrove trees just north of the centre or in the trees west of the mangroves, but nothing. Oswald and Hery had seen four birds on 29 August. We returned to the release centre and just through the cage we saw the free flying Bali Mynas, but all were ringed. We observed the birds for an hour. I felt a little disappointed not seeing the unringed bird, but Oswald assured me that the last three birds were more or less bred in the wild. Moreover, the population was already mixed with released birds, so an unringed bird will not guarantee it is of wild origin. At 11:15 we left the release centre and after a short boat ride we reached the jetty at Labuhan Lalang. There we had dinner in a small restaurant were two Russian boys started a fight, with the bigger one crashing the other boy with a chair! After some turmoil and shouting between the mothers and other Russians, we all were left flabbergasted! Oswald pretend he had seen nothing (he did!) and kept on sms-ing. Hery did a short nap and had seen or heard nothing. At 14:00 hours we started to look for the Javan Banded Pitta in the monsoon forest just west of the Labuhan Lalang. At first we saw a beautiful pair of Oriental Dwarf Kingfishers, followed by a Fulvous-chested Jungle-Flycatcher. When putting my binoculars on the flycatcher, our attraction was drawn by something bigger on the ground a foot away. Javan Banded Pitta! The Pitta – a male - was very cooperative and showed itself very well. It started calling and just some meters behind us the female responded. Then he hopped away.

Next on the program were the saltpans west of Bayuwedang, the best place on Bali to see Javan Plover. In the first saltpan we found one bird at close range and more birds were found further away. Other birds were Sacred Kingfisher, Red-necked Stint, Greenshank and Wood Sandpiper. Then we drove to the parking place of the Bali Barat Centre where Scarlet-headed Flowerpeckers were easy. We found at least a pair and furthermore we saw Orange-breasted Fruit-Dove, Common Iora and a female Brown-throated Sunbird (a new bird for me as the Greythroated Sunbird from the Philippines was split from this one). Finally we drove to the beautiful Gilimanuk Bay, where Lesser Adjutant and Beach Thick-knee were quickly found. A Little Blue Kingfisher and a pair of Sacred Kingfisher ended a good day of birding. We dropped Hery at his home nearby and Oswald brought me back to the villa, where arrived at 20:30 hours. I can recommend Oswald en Hery to everybody. They speak English very well, have a good sense of humor and are very keen and skillful to show you the difficult birds. For this day I paid \$ 175, but that included transport, entrance to the national park and the boat ride plus beverages. Oswald can be contacted at Oswald huma@hotmail.com, Hery at hery kn@yahoo.co.id (note the underscore _ between their surname and family name). Oswald lives in Denpasar and is also highly recommendable for other trips, like the Botanical Gardens, where he almost guarantees Sunda Thrush (something I would have known before I went there!).

- 1 September The last full day on Bali was spent relaxing, although a frigatebird caused some excitement. It appeared to be all dark in the sun, but on the screen of my camera it became clear it was a juvenile Greater Frigatebird. In the evening we had dinner in an Italian restaurant in Lovina.
- 2 September We were transported to Denpasar where we took the evening flight with Garuda to Singapore. In Singapore we took the flight to Amsterdam.

3 September Between Singapore and India we had a lot of turbulence and after a long night we finally landed at Schiphol, Amsterdam at around 7:00 AM, where we were picked up by our neighbor Henk who kindly brought us to our house in Alkmaar.

Species Accounts

Order and nomenclature follows <u>www.worldbirdnames.org</u>, version 11.2. The Elegant Pitta on Lombok is split into three species and the pitta on Lombok is now called Ornate Pitta.

Where names differed from the usual fieldguides, the alternative name is given. Birds restricted to Java and Bali or Lombok are in capitals.

Recommended Literature

On Bali I used the adequate A Field Guide to the Birds of Borneo, Sumatra, Java, and Bali: The Greater Sunda Islands by John MacKinnon & Karen Phillipps. On Lombok I used the also adequate A Guide to the Birds of Wallacea: Sulawesi, the Moluccas and Lesser Sunda Islands, Indonesia by Brian J. Coates, K. David Bishop and Dana Gardner.









31 Augustat least 4saltpans west of Bayuwedang, Bali Barat NP, Bali.One bird was observed very closely, so all diagnostic fieldmarks were seen.

28. Yellow Bittern - Ixobrychus sinensis

28 August 1 sitting in a rice field, Seririt, Bali.

29. Javan Pond Heron - Ardeola speciosa

Common on Bali, characteristically in rice fields. Unfortunately very shy and therefore difficult to photograph. All observed birds were in winter plumage.

30. Eastern Cattle Egret - Bubulcus coromandus

Fairly common on Bali, mainly in rice fields. On Lombok I observed a tree along the runway of the airport full of white herons presumed to be this species on 22 August.

31. Grey Heron - Ardea cinerea

22 August 1 flying out to the sea south of Senggigi, Lombok.

32. Great-billed Heron - Ardea sumatrana

31 August 2-3 Bali Barat NP, Bali. 1 Gilimanuk Bay, Bali.

33. Purple Heron - Ardea purpurea

At least 10 birds were seen daily between 16 and 21 August at Villa Ayode, Kedungu Bali flying past the villa in the evening on their way to the roosting place.

25 August 1 Gili Nanggu, Lombok.

34. Little Egret - Egretta garzetta

25 August3on a tidal beach near Lembar, Lombok.31 Augustc 10Bali Barat NP, Bali.

35. Short-toed Snake Eagle - Circaetus gallicus

26 August 1 flying past behind Villa Perac, Senggigi, Lombok.

36. Crested Serpent Eagle - Spilornis cheela

31 August 2 Bali Barat NP.

This species is the biggest enemy of the Bali Starling. One bird was caught between 29 and 31 August.

37. RINJANI SCOPS OWL - Otus jolandae

One or two birds heard every evening between 22 and 27 August, Villa Perac, Senggigi, Lombok. The call was reminiscent both of recordings of Sunda and Sulawesi Scops Owl. I consulted some birders and on 2 October 2011 George Sangster phoned me with the words "I know what it is". It proved that he himself had found it in 2003 and had already described it and was now waiting for publication. Everything about the discovery and the description of this species can be found in <u>this paper</u>. Sound recordings (including mine) can be found here at <u>Xeno canto</u>.

38. White-rumped Kingfisher - Caridonax fulgidus

26 August

1 calling loudly and swiftly passing by near the entrance of Gunung Rinjani NP, Lombok. Although seen shortly, one of the best birds of the holiday!

39. JAVAN KINGFISHER - Halcyon cyanoventris

19 August 2 in the rice fields at Villa Ayode, Kedungu, Bali; also on 20 August.




