




Map 2: Año Nuevo State Reserve.




Map 3: Paige Meadows, Tahoe City. Go the end at the Silver Tip Road (coordinates: (39.146257°, -120.173191°).



Map 4: Mono Lake and Lee Vining.




Map 5: LeConte's Thrasher location along the Kerto road, Maricopa, California.



Map 6: Pine Mountain, Mount Pinos Area, California.




Map 7: Forrestal Nature Reserve, Palos Verdes, Los Angeles, California.



Map 8: San Gabriel Mountains (north of Los Angeles).






Map 10: Imperial Dam and Mittry Lake. Black Rail was heard where the road was closest to the swamp.

Introduction

In 1994 Arnold Meijer, Leo Heemskerk and me, Jan van der Laan thought it was a good idea to visit the United States. California and Arizona seemed to be the best places to go in July or August. We only booked a ticket and a rental car. Motels were not booked beforehand. Information was taken from several listservers and several where-to-watch-birds books.

Itinerary

- 11-07 Departure from Schiphol, Amsterdam with Martinair to Oakland, California. After a 10-hour flight we arrived at Oakland International Airport at 12:00 am. There we picked up our rental car at Alamo (an Oldsmobile with air-conditioning) and drove via the San Mateo Bridge to Half Moon Bay. There we took Verde Road, 6 miles south of Half Moon Bay. Along this road was a small pond with a colony of Tricolored Blackbirds (thanks to Alan Eisner), where we found several birds, not easy to recognize because all birds were moulting. Next we checked all the rocky beaches between Half Moon Bay and the Año Nuevo State Reserve. Interesting birds were Surf Scoter, Heermann's, Western and California Gulls, Marbled Murrelet, Black Oystercatcher and Black Turnstones. Late afternoon we arrived at Año Nuevo State Reserve. Wrentit and Chestnut-backed Chickadee were quickly found. Later we drove to Santa Cruz, where a motel was also quickly found. We were so tired, we initially left the lights on.
- 12-07 In the morning we checked some rocky beaches in hope for Surfbirds. Pacific Loons, Pigeon Guillimots and Marbled Murrelets were present in good numbers plus a single Common Loon. Next we went to Año Nuevo SR and walked 1.5 miles to Bight Beach for the colony of Sea-elephants. We had good close views of this large barking animals. On our way back we managed to find the rarest breeding bird of Año Nuevo, the Black Swift. Other interesting birds were Willets, a Downy Woodpecker, California Thrasher, Chestnut-backed Chickadees, Red-shouldered Hawk and Tree Swallows. After that we drove via San Jose to Livermore, where we took the Mines Road, a small road south of Livermore. According to several birders this was a good spot for Lewis's Woodpecker and Lawrence's Goldfinch. The road turned out to be very long and winding, so half-way we decided to turn back to Livermore. Interesting birds were Golden Eagle, Lark Sparrow, Oak Titmouse, White-breasted Nuthatch, Lesser Goldfinch and Black-headed Grosbeak. Near Livermore we came upon a flock of Yellow-billed Magpies, the only true endemic species for California. Next we drove as far north as possible in the direction of Lake Tahoe. We made it to Truckee, some 20 miles north of Lake Tahoe. In the evening we phoned Richard Carlson, who gave us the latest information about Black-backed Woodpecker and Williamson's Sapsucker near Tahoe City. Overnight in a cabin-like motel in Truckee.
- 13-07 The whole morning was spend at Paige Meadows, consisting of four meadows in an alpine pine forest, just west of Tahoe City (see map 3). This place is one of the best spots to see Black-backed Woodpeckers. Unfortunately I was the only one who didn't see the female Leo and Arnold discovered. Other interesting birds were Hairy Woodpecker, Williamson's Sapsucker, Clark's Nutcracker, Fox and Chipping Sparrow, a single Hermit Warbler (which Leo didn't see), Nashville Warblers, Warbling Vireo, Western Tanager, Western Wood-Pewee, Mountain Chickadees, Evening Grosbeak and Broad-tailed Hummingbird. At noon we drove to Mono Lake about 150 miles south of Lake Tahoe. We arrived there in the late afternoon. Interesting birds we saw there were Western Osprey, Black-throated Sparrows, Pygmy Nuthatch and more Clark's Nutcrackers. Overnight in Lee Vining, which proved to be a little-value-for-much-money village (\$ 75 for a room and \$ 15 for one distasteful pizza).
- 14-07 In the morning we went to Lee Vining Lower Campground, a good spot for Red-breasted Sapsucker. Immediately we found one plus several Mountain Bluebirds. Next we went to Yosemite National Park. There we went to White Wolf, a campground in alpine pine forest. Interesting birds we saw there were Townsend's Solitaire, Cassin's Finch, Pine Grosbeak, Olive-sided and Dusky Flycatchers, Williamson's Sapsuckers, Blackheaded and Evening Grosbeaks. No Hermit Warblers, White-headed or (most sadly) Black-backed Woodpeckers. After dinner at White Wolf, we went to Crane Flats behind the Chevron Gas Station to look for Great Grey Owl, but no owls present. In the dark we drove back to our expensive motel room in Lee Vining.

- 15-07 After being wakened up by a drumming Hairy Woodpecker we went to the southern part of **Mono Lake**, which used to be according to Lolo and Jim Westrich's *Birder's Guide to Northern California* a reliable spot for Pinyon Jays and Lewis's Woodpeckers (see map 3). Both species were found without much effort. Next we went to **Lake Crowley**, which should be a good spot for Sage Grouse but more in another season at another time of the day. The most interesting birds we observed were Horned Lark, Sagebrsuh Sparrow, Sage Thrasher and Song Sparrow. We drove a long distance of c 250 miles to Maricopa in hot sunny weather. The airco of the car didn't work above 65 miles an hour! A stop was made at the **Kernville River Preserve** at the eastern shores of **Lake Isabella** along Highway 178. There we had our first Western Kingbirds and Blue Grosbeaks and a Monarch Butterfly. At sunset we reached **Maricopa**, the best-known place for the LeConte's Thrasher. At first we checked a spot southwest of the town, but this seemed not suitable enough (only two Burrowing Owls), so we drove to the place mentioned in Holt's *Birders Guide to Southern California* at **Kerto Road**. After five minutes Leo discovered two LeConte's Thrashers running between the bushes (see map 5). Also we saw our first Common Nighthawks, which remembered us of a slim female Montague's Harrier. Finally we drove to **Taft**, where we had dinner and went to sleep in a cheap motel.
- 16-07 In the morning we drove again to Maricopa, but this time no LeConte's Trashers were found, so we drove to Mount Pinos. On our way we had our first Roadrunners. The road to Mount Pinos, the Cerro Noroeste Road, led us through dry grassy hills with lots of Horned Larks, Western Kingbirds, Western Meadowlarks, California Quails, our first Anna's Hummingbird and lots of chipmunks. At Pine Mountain we found our first Whiteheaded Woodpeckers. We went directly to the road to Mount Pinos itself and at Iris Meadow (a meadow just above the parking lot at the end of the road) we saw an Empidonax, Green-tailed Towhee and Pygmy Nuthatches. Also there we met an American family, who had just seen a Condor at Pine Mountain Campground. Moreover they told us that there were Lawrence's Goldfinches at this campground, drinking from time to time at a running tap plus loads of hummers at the feeders of the headquarters. So we went immediately to Pine Mountain Campground, just west of the village and met some birders who gave us useful information about finding Saw-whet Owls in the San Gabriel Mountains, warblers on Mount Lemmon and Lazuli Buntings at Malibu. Furthermore they just had seen a female Calliope Hummingbird at the feeders of the headquarters. But first we decided to buy some drinks and snacks in the village and halfway between the campground and the village a large raptor was soaring above the road: an immature California Condor, joined by another! We had good views of both of them and this very good sighting was celebrated in the village. As far is now known to us five birds were released last year, of which one died and the rest was transferred to Lion Canyon north of Ventura. At least three birds were returning to the original Condor spot the past few days, the very spot we observed them! The rest of the day was spent in the shade of the headquarters of the camping ground, where we saw Lawrence's Goldfinch, Anna's, Rufous and Black-chinned Hummingbirds and the single female Calliope Hummingbird. Other interesting birds were Bullock's Oriole, Olive-sided Flycatcher, Black-headed Grosbeak and Western Bluebird. Late afternoon we went to Gorman, where we found a motel, had dinner and went to sleep.
- 17-07 Next morning we went back to **Iris Meadow, Mount Pinos** to look for Mountain Quail, but the only interesting birds we saw there were Fox Sparrow and Pygmy Nuthatch. So we went back to the Pine Mountain Campground again, where a family of Mountain Quails was quickly found. After an hour or so we left the Mount Pinos area for Ventura across Highway 33, which was long and winding. The only interesting birds there were Wrentits, Phainopepla and Black-chinned Hummingbirds (or were they Costa's?). From **Ventura** we drove to **Santa Barbara**, where we heard the finals of the world championship football on the radio, with Brazil winning. In Santa Barbara we went to the **Botanical Gardens**, where we found a pair of Nuttall's Woodpeckers, several Hutton's Vireos, Pacific-slope Flycatcher and a Red-shouldered Hawk. We took a motel in Santa Barbara, had dinner in a Chinese restaurant and went to sleep.
- 18-07 In the morning we checked the beach of Santa Barbara, but nothing special was found, so we drove to Malibu Lagoon in Malibu, according to Holt's A Birder's Guide to Southern California a good spot for Allen's Hummingbird (see page 9, 1990 edition). We found several Allen's Hummingbirds (but only one full adult male) and also Hooded Oriole, Elegant Tern, American Golden Plover and Spotted Sandpiper. Next we checked the hills north of Malibu for Lazuli Buntings and Black-chinned Sparrows. The Lazuli Bunting was quickly found

together with Say's Phoebe, Lawrence's Goldfinch, White-throated Swift, Rufous-crowned Sparrow, Pacificslope Flycatcher, Allen's Hummingbirds plus a beautiful male Costa's Hummingbird sitting quietly on a dead branch for minutes! After that we drove to **Palos Verdes Peninsula** in **Los Angeles** for the California Gnatcatcher at the end of **Forrestal Drive** as described in Holt (page 58-59, 1990 edition). Several California Gnatcatchers were quickly found and after dinner in a typical back neighborhood of Los Angeles we drove through the **San Gabriel Mountains** to **Wrightwood**, where we took a motel for the next two nights.

- 19-07 In the morning we went to **Bob's Gap** near **Valyermo** on the northern side of the San Gabriel Mountains. This place was only a few years before a good spot for the Grey Vireo, but apparently due to the excessive use of tape-recorders the birds had left the area and we had not our fool's luck to find them. Interesting birds we saw here were Cactus Wren, Black-throated Sparrows, Oak Titmouse and our first Ladder-backed Woodpeckers. The rest of the day was spent at the Buckhorn Flat Campground in the center of the mountains, which proved to be a very good spot: White-headed Woodpecker, Red-breasted Sapsucker, California Thrasher, Western Bluebirds, our only Purple Finches and a male MacGillivray's Warbler. In the evening we had dinner near the campground, where also a Great Horned Owl was calling. At nightfall we checked the Chilao Campground for Saw-whet Owl. We tried to lure this bird by imitating its call. At first a Long-eared Owl appeared, then after the second trial a Saw-whet Owl answered and gave a very brief appearance. It called for a period for 15 minutes and this was interrupted by a dark shadow, wing-flapping and the breaking of twigs. After that we didn't hear the Owl ever again. Full of guilt we drove back to Wrightwood, but near Dawson Saddle another owl crossed the road in the headlights of the car. We stopped and heard a Flammulated Owl calling, but we couldn't get it into sight. However, this bird was alive when we left! Finally we reached Wrightwood where we spent the night.
- 20-07 We rose not too early and after breakfast we drove to the **Salton Sea**. After phoning home in **Mecca** we went to **Salton City** on the western shore of the Salton Sea. Here we had our first Yellow-footed Gulls, flocks of Wilson's Phalarope, large flocks of Cattle Egrets, White-faced Ibises and Great-tailed Grackles, a very curious Roadrunner (which sat on the car) plus many Verdins. Next we went to **Finney Lake** (a small lake on the southern side), where we saw Little Bittern, Marsh Wren and a mixed pair of Western and Clark's Grebes. We made a short stop at the headquarters, where we found our first Abert's Towhees. Next we went to **Red Hill Landing** in the southeast corner of the Salton Sea. Lots of Burrowing Owls in this area. A group of 18 Wood Storks was quickly found plus several Black Skimmers. We ended this day in **Brawley**, found a motel (the Desert Inn) with a swimming pool and finally, at last: Pizza Hut!
- 21-07 In the early morning we went back to Finney Lake. Marsh Wrens, Little Bittern and Lesser Nighthawks were quickly found, but nothing more special. Later in the morning we reached the Imperial Dam, north of Yuma in search for several rails. At West Pond we found Osprey and a Gull-billed Tern and had very close looks of a Virginia Rail. At Mittry Lake we suddenly heard a calling male Black Rail. We heard this bird for about 10-15 minutes, the time we need to reach this spot, since we had to walk through dense scrub between the road and the borders of Mittry Lake (50 yards). After positioning ourself in a triangle we played the tape of its call and waited anxiously what would happen...nothing, the bird stopped calling! After this very remarkable record we looked in vain for the Ridgway's Rail (aka Yuma Clapper Rail) and drove next to Tucson, Arizona. There we went to Wilmot Road in the eastern part of Tucson, which was according to H.R. Holt's *A Birder's Guide to Southeastern Arizona* (page 96, 1989 edition) a good spot for Rufous-winged Sparrow, which was found after moderate effort. Others bird included Curve-billed Thrasher, Lesser Nighthawk, Black-throated Sparrow and Brown-crested Flycatcher. Finally we went to the Best Western's Executive Inn (\$ 39 for three persons), where we had dinner, a swim in the pool and went to sleep.
- 22-07 Today Mount Lemmon (north-east of Tucson) was on the program. At first we stopped at Molino Basin, a small campground, where we had our first Bridled Titmouse plus Rufous-crowned Sparrows and Canyon Wren. The next stop was Bear Canyon (aka General Hitchcock Campground), where we saw Yellow-eyed Juncos, two recently fledged Cooper's Hawks, Grace's Warbler, Black-throated Grey Warbler, Plumbeous, Bell's and Hutton's Vireos and Painted Redstarts. After that we went to the top of Mount Lemmon, where we met a birder from Texas, who showed us Virginia's Warbler and Corderillan Flycatcher. Together with him we found Red-faced and Olive Warblers. We made a short lunch-stop at the Ski Lodge and after that we went

north of Tucson to **Catalina State Park**, which was a good spot for Rufous-winged Sparrow this year. After a long search in the afternoon with only Northern Cardinals and Gila Woodpeckers present, we finally managed to find two Rufous-winged Sparrows just before a severe thunderstorm. Finally we returned to **Tucson** to our motel with swimming pool.

- 23-07 In the morning we visited Proctor Road at the lower part of Madera Canyon. Varied Buntings were easily found as was a singing Northern Beardless-Tyrannulet (but we could get it into view) and our first Broad-billed Hummingbird. Next we checked the grassy fields at Road 406, which yielded Cassin's Kingbirds and Cassin's and Botteri's Sparrows. Then we drove to the Santa Rita Lodge and the Polisport Gift Shop in the middle of Madera Canyon, where we saw Broad-billed, Rufous, Black-chinned, Broad-billed, Blue-throated and Magnificent Hummingbirds, Scott's Oriole, Canyon Wren and Corderillan Flycatchers. We hiked the Super Trail and the Vault Mine Trail at the end of the road at the parking lots for a few miles, but now Trogons yet. The only interesting birds there were Dusky-capped and Sulphur-bellied Flycatchers. In the evening we tried the Elf Owls at the Santa Rita Lodge, but nothing appeared. We heard three Whiskered Screech-Owls and two Whip-poor-wills. Finally we tried the Buff-collared Nightjar at the McCleary Wash. This bird was present in May and June, but gave only brief appearances in July, although it was heard and seen the next days after we tried. The only nightjar we heard was a Common Poorwill. Overnight again in Tucson.
- 24-07 In the morning we went back to Madera Canyon. First we tried Florida Canyon Wash for Lucy's Warbler, but I was the only one seeing one. Next we hiked the Vault Mine Trail at the Lower Round-up Picnic Area at the end of the road for a few miles. Still no Trogons, but at last we found two Arizona Woodpeckers and a Hepatic Tanager. At noon we went to Patagonia, where we visited the famous Patagonia Roadside Rest Area (1 mile south of Patagonia on the east side of the road). Here we saw Lucy's Warbler, Black Vulture, Grey Hawk and White-throated Swifts. No sign yet of the Becards and Thick-billed Kingbirds. After that we went to the Paton's in Patagonia, a family who have opened their garden for birders. They have several feeders and at this feeders a <u>Violet-crowned Hummingbird</u> is around for almost four years. This bird was quickly found and while walking back to our car a passing Zone-tailed Hawk completed a good day of birding. We drove to Nogales, found a motel with swimming pool, had dinner (Mexican food and Corona's) and went to sleep.
- 25-07 Early in the morning we returned to the rest area south of Patagonia and had more luck this time: the whole family of Rose-throated Becards was around at their nesting site and gave good close views. A pair of Thick-billed Kingbirds was also around plus Summer Tanager, Lucy's Warbler and Yellow-breasted Chat. The Sonoita Creek Sanctuary (in Patagonia) was next on the program. This proved a little bit disappointing, the only interesting birds here were Thick-billed Kingbirds, Yellow Warblers and a Song Sparrow. Around 10:30 AM we drove to Sierra Vista, had lunch and entered the grounds of Fort Huachica in order to get to the Scheelite and Sawmill Canyons. In the Scheelite Canyon we found two Spotted Owls and a small rattle-snake. In the Sawmill Canyon we found Buff-breasted Flycatchers (this is the best spot in the USA), our only Greater Pewee, Olive-sided Flycatcher, Cooper's Hawk, Painted Redstart and Grace's Warbler. Later in the afternoon we drove to Mile Hi, Ramsey Canyon (4 miles south of Sierra Vista). This place is very famous for its hummingbirds. This summer a male White-eared Hummingbird was present and this bird was quickly found. A nice family, whom we met at several occasions, gave us useful information about the Chiricahua Mountains and about finding Lucifer and Berrylline Hummingbirds. Finally we drove to Tombstone, where another motel with a swimming pool was found, had dinner and went to sleep.
- 26-07 In the morning we visited again the Ramsey Canyon to look for the Elegant Trogons. At the parking lot we saw our third Arizona Woodpecker. We walked to the place where the Hamburg Trail meets the Nature Trail and waited two hours for the Trogons to show up. Nothing appeared, the most interesting birds were Golden Eagle and Hepatic Tanager. While walking back, we met a birder who had seen thee or four Eared Trogons higher up in the canyon. Unfortunately we had no time, since a two-hour drive to Portal, Chiricahua Mountains was on the program. In Portal, we immediately went to the Spofford's (Walter and Sally), a couple with feeders in their backyard. After one-and-a-half hour the female Lucifer Hummingbird turned up for a short period before she vanished. Next we went to the Rangers Station (one mile further south). To our great surprise a male Montezuma Quail crossed the road plus a female on the side of the road. At the Rangers Station the feeders had dried up, so our chances to see a Berrylline Hummingbird were almost nil now. So we

decided to drive to **Rustler Park**, a camping ground higher up in the mountains. This meant 15 miles on a winding dirt road, but we reached the park without any problems. This park is famous for the Mexican Chickadees and a flock of about 10 birds was found without effort. Finally we returned to **Portal**, where we took a motel and at this motel we saw 3 males Calliope Hummingbirds! An English group of Cygnus Wildlife gave us good information where to find Scaled Quails and Black-chinned Sparrows. After dinner we went back into the canyon to search for owls. We heard a Northern Pygmy-Owl at the **Stewart Campground**, but this proved to be tape-recorder! Nevertheless, a pair of Western Screech-Owls was quickly found. At last we went to our motel to sleep.

- 27-07 In the morning we walked a part of the South Fork Trail in search for Elegant Trogons. After two hours we found a female and two juveniles very close-by. Very silent here, but Leo managed to find another Red-faced Warbler. After that we returned to our motel, had breakfast and drove up the Paradise-Silver Creek Road. Two Black-chinned Sparrows were quickly found. At noon we drove back to Tucson, with a stop at Willcox. There we checked the sewage ponds, where we saw Short-billed Dowitchers, Baird's, Least, Western, Solitary and Spotted Sandpipers, Greater Yellowlegs, Eastern Meadowlarks, Ruddy Ducks, Cinnamon Teals and Mexican Ducks plus a strange black-headed duck, most probably a Ruddy Duck with a completely black head. Scaled Quails were quickly found at the golf course next to the sewage ponds. After that we drove to the San Xavier Mission (south of Tucson), where we quickly found Bendire's, Curve-billed and Crissal Thrashers just east of the mission and north of the hill with the cross. The Bendire's Thrasher was nesting in the north-east corner of this area (thanks to Daan Sandee). Finally we went back to our beloved Best Western in Tucson and went to sleep.
- 28-07 In the morning we went back to the San Xavier Mission, since Arnold hadn't seen the Bendire's Thrasher well. We found all the thrashers here and had good looks of each of them. After breakfast in Tucson we went to Dudleyville to look for the Mississippi Kites here, which were easily found (of course!). Next we checked the Aravaipa Canyon (south of Dudleyville) for the Common Black-Hawk, but this one didn't show up, although a recently fledged Zone-tailed Hawk was sitting quietly on a branch. Also we tried the Redington Pass Road for the Grey Vireo, but we didn't know where to look exactly and it was blazingly hot in the desert, so we decided to quit birding and leave Arizona. We made it to Yuma, where we found a Best Western with swimming pool, had dinner (with Corona's), a swim and went to sleep.
- 29-07 In the morning we went to Red Hill Landing, Salton Sea, but nothing new was discovered today. Interesting birds were Wood Stork (30 individuals now), Yellow-legged Gulls, American Bittern, Black Skimmers and again lots of Sandpipers. Again the Visitor Center was closed (of course). Next we drove to San Diego. On our way we checked the Kitchen Creek Road (about 40 miles east of San Diego), since this was another good spot for Grey Vireo according to Holt's *Birders Guide to Southern California* (page 103, 1990 edition). No vireos, but Black-chinned Sparrow, Nuttall's Woodpecker and a large flock of Lawrence's Goldfinches. In San Diego, we drove north to La Jolla, where according to the San Diego's Rare Bird Alert a Scripps's Murrelet was present for the past few days. After carefully watching the bay, we suddenly saw the murrelet flying out to sea. A flock of Elegant Terns flew close by plus a few Common Terns. Finally we drove to Los Angeles, where we took a motel in the western part (near Hollywood), had dinner at the Taco's Bell and went to sleep.
- **30-07** The whole day was spent driving to Monterey. Nothing interesting on our way along the slowly progressing Highway 1. The only interesting birds were a Belted Kingfisher, Anna's Hummingbird, a Red-shouldered Hawk and a non-flying Oldsquaw in **Monterey** at the **Fishermen's Wharf**. We had some trouble in finding a motel, because of a Garlic Festival and an Antique Show at the same time. Finally we found a motel in **Castroville**, had dinner in a good restaurant and went to sleep.
- 31-07 Today we went out with a boat off **Monterey** with Shearwater Journeys. This pelagic trip was very interesting and highly recommended (costs \$ 65). We saw several good birds such as Black-footed Albatrosses, Sooty Shearwaters (abundant), Pink-footed Shearwaters, Pomarine and Parasitic Jaegers, Sabine's Gulls, Red and Red-necked Phalaropes, Elegant Terns, Common Murre, Cassin's and Rhinoceros Auklets and a Scripps's Murrelet (not seen well enough by us to count). Also mammals like Humpback Whale, Mink Whale, Dall Porpoise and Grey-sided Dolphins plus a Northern Fur Seal and last, but not least, several Blue Sharks! We

returned in the harbor at 3:00 pm, had a very fat lunch and finally we drove north to **Half Moon Bay** and checked all rocky beaches north of Santa Cruz for Surfbirds. At **Pescadero State Beach** we found 4 Surfbirds, making Arnold and myself very happy, since we had missed this one in Alaska in 1991 and we were the hoax of the town ever since! At last we found a strange motel in **Half Moon Bay**, had dinner and went to sleep.

01-08 This day we only drove to **Oakland International Airport**, returned our car without any problems, checked in at 3:00 pm. After a long tedious flight without any room for my legs (as usual the places with room were given away to people shorter than 5 feet) we finally reached **Schiphol, Amsterdam** at 10:00 am.

The Species Accounts

Common and scientific names and phylogenetic sequence follow the AOU Check-list of North American Birds, 6th edition (American Ornithologists' Union. 1983. Check-list of North American Birds. 6th edition. Baltimore: American Ornithologists' Union). However recent developments like the splitting of Western Grebe, Western Flycatcher, Brown Towhee and Black-tailed Gnatcatchers are taken into view in this report. In the 2018 version we follow the common and scientific names and family order of the IOC www.worldbirdnames.org, version 9.1. Specialities for the region are in capitals, but these are not necessary endemic for the region.
