Report of a Birding Trip to

Thailand

from 10th March to 20th March 2012



Introduction

Between 10 and 20th March 2012 we, Arjan Brenkman and Jan van der Laan, made a trip to Thailand. Our main objective was to see the Spoon-billed Sandpiper and thereafter to see as many local specialties as possible. This idea was born in October 2011 on the isle of Vlieland, when we met by accident in the main street of Vlieland. It became quickly clear we shared a mutual interest in the Spoonbill Sandpiper and Pittas, so we had to be in Thailand as soon as possible! Now, the most difficult part was to convince our dear wives, but they both understood that great birds do not appear in your living room. We opted for a short trip, even so short that Arjan returned home on 17th March, while Jan went south to Khao Nor Chuchi to try his luck for Gurney's Pitta, a bird Arjan had already seen.

At first, we thought to do it ourselves, but after Karel Hoogteyling and friends visited Thailand a few weeks before us and tipped us off for a good guide, we decided to use the services of Tony Eagle Eye (see <u>link here</u>) for the 6 days between 11th and 16th March. This proved to be a very good choice, as Tony was an extremely good guide, a good companion with good sense of humor and he never gave up, while Aoyja is a good and save driver! In short: highly recommendable!

Itinerary

- **10 March** We took the flight Cl0066 of China Airlines at 14:00 hours to Bangkok. Quiet flight with the ins-andouts of the video system only discovered on the way back.
- Arrival at Bangkok at 6:45. Picked-up by Thanaphat Kinglek aka Tony and Mathika Puengthet aka 11 March Aoyja (pronounced as Oi) from Thai Birding. Drove to Pak Tale. On our way several accidents (no fatalities) were seen caused by the sudden rains. On arrival at Pak Tale, it was cloudy, so the circumstances for birding were at its best. We went to the saltpans that were most frequently visited by the Spoonbill Sandpipers and indeed after less than half an hour we found one bird! We observed this bird for almost an hour. After that we went to Laem Phak Bia to search for Whitefaced Plover. First, we had lunch and after lunch we took the boat through the mangroves to the famous sand spit. There we saw good numbers of Broad-billed Sandpipers, Red-necked Stints, Greater and Lesser Sandplovers, three Chinese Egrets and several Malaysian Plovers. The Whitefaced Plover could not be found and information from the restaurants logbook revealed the last sighting was on 6 March. Later that afternoon we drove back to Pak Tale and in one of the saltpans between Laem Phak Bia and Pak Tale, we found a group of 57 Nordmann's Greenshanks! In the saltpans at Pak Tale we returned to the Spoonbill Sandpiper and at the same location we found four Spoonbill Sandpipers together. We could see the birds very well till dusk and we were now more satisfied with seeing our main objective. We drove in the direction of Kaeng Krachan and on our way Tony knew a good place to see Indian Nightjar. Indeed, the nightjar was quickly found and after a nice dinner at a nice restaurant overlooking the large lake west of Kaeng Krachan NP we went to our hotel at Baanmaka Resort.
- 12 March We did rise early to get as early as possible in Kaeng Krachan NP in order to find owls and hopefully frogmouths. We heard and saw several Brown Boobooks, but no frogmouths. Later that day we found day-time resting Asian Barred Owlet and Collared Owlet along with White-faced Scops-Owl and Brown Hawk-Owls (now called Boobooks). We concentrated in the area between the 1st and the 3rd stream crossing. This produced a lot of birds like Green-legged Partridge, Red Junglefowl, Grey Peacock-Pheasant, Crested Serpent Eagle, Vernal Hanging Parrot, Orange-breasted Trogon, Oriental Dwarf Kingfisher, Blue-bearded Bee-eater, Tickell's Brown Hornbill, Oriental Pied Hornbill, Streak-breasted Woodpecker, Greater Flameback, Buff-rumped Woodpecker, Great Slaty Woodpecker, Swinhoe's Minivet, Black Drongo, Ashy Drongo, Greater Racket-tailed Drongo, Blacknaped Monarch, Common Green Magpie, Sultan Tit, Black-crested Bulbul, Ochraceous Bulbul, Yellow-browed Warbler, Sulphur-breasted Warbler, Common Tailorbird, Rufous-fronted Babbler, Spot-necked Babbler, Greater Necklaced Laughingthrush, Asian Fairy-bluebird, Sulphur-breasted Leaf-Warbler, Common Hill Myna, Asian Brown Flycatcher, Blue-winged Leafbird and Scarletbacked Flowerpecker. Near stream 1 we suddenly heard a calling Blue Pitta and after a duel of almost an hour, the bird came into sight and even through Tony's telescope, we could see this extremely beautiful bird calling! Next, we went to the White-faced Scops-Owl roost, but an elephant had trembled through its favorite bush, so it was no longer present. While Arjan and I were thinking what the best strategy could be, Tony suddenly appeared from the bushes with the announcement he had found the bird again. What was much better, there were two birds! At noon we birded around the campground where we observed Grey Peacock-Pheasant, Crested Serpent Eagle, Vernal Hanging Parrot, Violet Cuckoo, Himalayan Swiftlet, Asian Palm Swift, Cook's Swift, Green-eared Barbet, Coppersmith Barbet and Taiga Flycatcher. After lunch we returned to the streams where we finally had good looks of Bamboo Woodpecker at stream 3 and Ferruginous Partridge near stream 2. Just before dark we left the area, had lunch at the same place as yesterday and after a successful search for Collared Scops-Owl we went to bed.

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- 13 March Today we concentrated on the higher elevations of Kaeng Krachan. First stop at Km 24 produced Red-bearded Bee-eater, Grey Peacock-pheasant (finally all had good looks!), Golden Babbler, Raffles's Malkoha, Rusty-naped Pitta (heard only), Bar-winged Flycatcher-shrike, Large Woodshrike, Great Iora, Rufous Treepie and Black-winged Cuckooshrike amongst others. We continued our way to the Panoeng Tong Campsite, Kaeng Krachan NP, where we saw three Tenasserim Langours, Ratchet-tailed Treepie, Blue Rock-Thrush, Oriental Honey-Buzzard, Crested Goshawk, Mountain Imperial Pigeon, Himalayan Swiftlet, Cook's Swift, Wreathed Hornbill, Radde's Warbler, Flavescent Bulbul and Ochraceous Bulbul. After lunch we went in the direction of the Tor Tip waterfall, where we saw Ruby-cheeked Sunbird, Plain Sunbird, Crimson Sunbird, Little Spiderhunter and Streaked Spiderhunter. After that we walked down from the Panoeng Tong Campsite to the vista point at Km 24. We were particularly looking for Pin-tailed Parrotfinch, which we heard one time just a kilometer down from the campground, but could not get it into view. Later we learned that Hans Matheve had seen about four birds at that general location! Best birds we saw were Brown-throated Sunbird, Olive-backed Sunbird, Black-throated Sunbird, Long-tailed Broadbill, Greater Flameback and Crow-billed Drongo. Last hours of daylight was spent birding at the streams 2 and 3 where we tried again to see Ferruginous Partridge. While leaving the National Park a Kalij Pheasant crossed the road and an Indian Elephant made its way on the asphalt too. Happily, this was one of the peaceful brands, which was fine for Arjan. We had dinner at the same restaurant at the lake and finally we went to sleep.
- 14 March In the early morning we visited the blind at **Baan Nong Sok**, a lovely small resort near the large lake east of Kaeng Krachan, where we had good and close sightings of Green-legged Partridge, Barbacked Partridge, Red Junglefowl, Greater and Lesser Necklaced Laughing-Thrushes, Pale-legged Leaf Warbler, Abbott's Babbler, White-rumped Shama, Siberian Blue Robin, Taiga Flycatcher, Black-naped Monarch, Indochinese Blue Flycatcher, White-rumped Munia, Sooty-headed Bulbul and Golden-fronted Leafbird. After breakfast we drove in the direction of Bangkok, but after c 40 minutes, just before highway 4, Aoyja received a phone call with the message that her wallet has been found at Baan Song Nok! So, we had to return. After collecting the wallet, we drove in the direction of Highway 4 and during a stop we encountered a large flock of Grey-faced Buzzards, one Spotted Eagle (new tick for Tony), Baya Weaver, Siberian Rubythroat, Oriental Pratincole, Javan Pond Heron, White-breasted Kingfisher and a probable Japanese Sparrowhawk. After lunch at a KFC (my first ever and now I can say, my last), we passed Bangkok and just before dark, we reached our hotel near the entrance of Khao Yai NP. From the balcony we discovered a group of exactly 10 Plain-backed Sparrows sitting on the antenna of a house opposite the hotel! After some last birding in the dusk, with Golden-headed Cisticola, Asian Koel and Brown Shrike as best birds, we had dinner and after that we went to sleep.
- 15 March We started at the Pa Gluay Mai Campsite in Khao Yai to wait for Coral-billed Ground Cuckoo. We only heard the cuckoo, but saw Blue-eared Kingfisher, Siberian Blue Robin, Plain-tailed Warbler and Puff-throated Babbler. On the parking lot we saw Two-barred Greenish Warbler, Green-eared Barbet, Moustached Barbet, Blue-eared Barbet and Swinhoe's & Scarlet Minivets. The next stop was at the military camp where a good vista point is. At this vista point we saw Black Eagle, Rufous-bellied Hawk-Eagle, Asian House Martin, Radde's Warbler, Ashy Bulbul, Puff-throated Bulbul and Ashy Drongo. After lunch we went to the Haew Suwat Restaurant to look for Coral-billed Ground-Cuckoo. On arrival we heard at least three birds and with one bird we had a duel for about two hours. We managed to see only fleeting glimpses, but exciting this duel was anyway. On our way back, we had an encounter with an enormous scorpion, which tried to cross the road. We had dinner near our hotel and went to sleep early. We could not visit the so-called b-trail at km 31, as there were making a movie there. Indeed, we repeatedly stuck upon a motor driver followed by a large film-crew. We guess the title of the movie must be something of Return of... The Sequel.

- 16 March In the early morning together with Isara Sukkhum (aka Mr. Isara), we tried the trail between the main entrance and HQ for Eared Pitta, but we 'only' could find Large Scimitar-Babbler, Blue Pitta (heard only), Coral-billed Ground-Cuckoo (again heard only), Puff-throated Babbler and Abbott's Babbler. Next, we visited a fruiting tree along the road near-by, where we saw Thick-billed Green Pigeon, Oriental Pied Hornbill, Brown-backed Needletail and Ruby-cheeked Sunbird. Suddenly Tony began to shout for the telescope as he was walking a few hundred-meter south. There we heard the call of an Eared Pitta. In no time we found the bird, sitting on a fallen log. It moved and was free for a few seconds, revealing all its plumage characters! One of the highlights and another good find of Tony! Next, we went again to the Haew Suwat Restaurant to try again for the Ground Cuckoo, but we only heard one distant bird. We finally did some birding on trail 5 (formerly known as trail 6), but this was closed, but we were allowed to walk to the biggest tree with a nest of Austen's Brown Hornbill, but this didn't show up. After lunch we drove back to Bangkok International Airport where we arrived at 15:00 hours. We said goodbye to Tony and Aoyja and promised to come back for birding in North Thailand in the near future. On the airport Arjan and I said goodbye to each other, as for Arjan it was time to take the plane back to Holland. I took the plane to Krabi with Thai Airways at 16:50 hours. The flight departed on time and at Krabi I was
 - picked up by a taxi driver from Southern Taxi who brought me in less than 45 minutes to the **Morakot Resort** near the **Khao Nor Chuchi Reserve**. After a good dinner, I went to sleep early as the next days I would look for the rarest Pitta of Asia, the Gurney's. At 6:00 hours breakfast and at 6:30 Yotin Meekaew arrived and we immediately went to the **U**-
- 17 March At 6:00 hours breakfast and at 6:30 Yotin Meekaew arrived and we immediately went to the Utrail area to look for a pair of Gurney's which could be around as they were seen two days before. Due to the prolonged rains since December, the forest was not dry enough. Normally the driest period is between January and April and it is then when the Gurney's Pitta find food in the last remaining wet parts, the gullies. Now the pittas could be anywhere and worse, they were not calling. First, we went to a particular gully, where we sat in a blind and waited for almost two hours. Nothing happened, so we went to another place. There more nothing happened, so around noon we returned to the Morakot Resort, had lunch and went birding again in the U-trail area in the afternoon. Around 15:00 hours it started to rain and it only stopped at midnight. Best birds were Gould's Frogmouth, Blyth's Paradise Flycatcher, Red-crowned Barbet, Forest Wagtail, and a heardonly Banded Pitta. We tried several locations for Bay Owl, but it rained too much. I had dinner in the Morakot and was joined by Peter, a birder from the USA, who had a knee surgery in Thailand and was slowly recovering. Also present where Hans Matheve and Jasmin Lauwaert, who gave me a beer to thank me for the information on Ferruginous Partridge (which Hans saw and I did not!).
- 18 March Full day birding in Khao Nor Chuchi. First, we visited a hide near the A-trail where two beautiful Malayan Banded Pittas were seen feeding in a gully. Till noon we birded B-trail in search for Gurney's Pitta. Best birds were Large Wren-babbler (heard only), Moustached Hawk-Cuckoo, Banded Kingfisher (with large spider in its bill), Green Broadbill and several bulbuls and babblers. It was very humid and hot and birding was slow, but every time I had the feeling something good would show up. But no Gurney's. In the afternoon we birded just north of the resort, Khlong Tom and later in the afternoon the U-trail area again. I returned just in time for dinner and at the Morakot resort Hans told me he had seen a male Gurney's at the exact place where we had seen Banded Kingfisher and Green Broadbill. I decided to go to the B-trail first thing in the morning.
- **19 March** In the morning I did a final attempt with Hans to find Gurney's Pitta along **trail B**. After sitting near a gully for half an hour I went to the place where Hans had seen the bird the day before. I heard loud and clear the *tsilit*-call of a Gurney's Pitta, but I first I had to exclude if Hans was not playing a tape. Nobody was around at the place where I heard the Pitta, but the undergrowth was just too thick to find the bird. After more long waits at several gullies, I had to give up and returned to the Morakot Resort. After lunch a taxi brought me to the **Krabi Mangrove Boardwalk** where I did some

birding the rest of the afternoon. Mangrove Pitta was quickly found and after a lost duel with a Ruddy Kingfisher and two Brown-winged Kingfishers, I gave up birding. The same taxi brought me to the airport where I took the 19:00 hour flight to Bangkok. At **Bangkok international Airport** I had to wait a few hours before check-in, but time went fast as a parade of 100s of very weird people passed-by (mostly Europeans, the hippies won't come back, you say?). After checking-in I found a large couch, where I rest for a few hours before departure.

20 March The plane to Amsterdam left on time at around 2:30 hours. After a long uneventful flight, I landed just before 9:00 hours at Schiphol, Amsterdam.

Species Accounts

Order and nomenclature follows <u>www.worldbirdnames.org</u>, version 12.2. Where names differed from the usual fieldguides, the alternative name is sometimes, but not always, given. The photographs are generally in chronological order. In the 14.1 version, Olive-backed Sunbird was split into eight species, with Ornate Sunbird as the new Olive-backed Sunbird split and Cambodian Flowerpecker was split from Fire-breasted Flowerpecker.

Recommended Literature

We used the two well-known field guides, *A guide to the Birds of Thailand* by Boonsong Lekagul and Philip D. Round (1991) and *A Guide to the Birds of Southeast Asia: Thailand, Peninsular Malaysia, Singapore, Myanmar, Laos, Vietnam, Cambodia* by Craig Robson (2000), both very useful. Round & Lekagul has the advantage of having distribution maps.


Culture





14 March 2 (pair) at the hide near Kaeng Krachan NP, allowing unsurpassed views.

004. Kalij Pheasant - Lophura leucomelanos crawfurdii

13 March 1 (male) between Ban Krang campground and the main entrance of Kaeng Krachan NP.

Which pheasant is present in KK – either Silver or Kalij – is a total mystery for us. We follow IOC-systematics, who place the taxon *crawfurdii* in Kalij Pheasant.

005. Green-legged Partridge - Tropicoperdix chloropus

Commonly heard along the main trail in Kaeng Krachan NP on 12 March. Two were seen moving away into the forest after we startled them at the White-fronted Scops Owl roost site. Another pair came in for a drink at the Baan Song Nok hide on 14 March, allowing brilliant views in the open. On 16 March a flock was heard at the start of trail 33 at Khao Yai NP. Also known as Scaly-breasted Partridge.

006. GREY PEACOCK-PHEASANT - Polyplectron bicalcaratum

12 March	c 5	birds heard in Kaeng Krachan NP and 1 seen at the Ban Krang campground.
13 March	c 8	birds heard in Kaeng Krachan NP and 1 seen well at Km 24.

007. Red Junglefowl - Gallus gallus

Commonly heard at both Kaeng Krachan NP and Khao Yai NP. About 10 seen on the road in Kaeng Krachan NP and two females with chicks came in for a drink at the Baan Song Nok hide. Also, a pair was feeding in recently burned grassland at Khao Yai NP.

008. Great Eared Nightjar - Lyncornis macrotis

12 March 1 (seen in the headlights) just before entrance of Kaeng Krachan NP.

009. Large-tailed Nightjar - Caprimulgus macrurus

Several individuals heard daily around our hotel room in Baanmaka and in Kaeng Krachan NP in the early morning. In the evening of 12 March, we had splendid observations of a bird feeding on insects and sitting on a wire at the same location where we observed Collared Scops-owl.

010. Indian Nightjar - Caprimulgus asiaticus

12 March 1 (tape-lured and eventually seen) near Pak Tale.

011. Gould's Frogmouth - Batrachostomus stellatus

17 March 1 (well seen at roosting site) in the old plantation area, Khao Nor Chuchi.

012. Grey-rumped Treeswift - Hemiprocne longipennis

18 March 3 U-trail area, Khao Nor Chuchi.

013. Himalayan Swiftlet - Aerodramus brevirostris

12 Marchc 10(ssp rogersii) lower part of Kaeng Krachan NP.15 Marchc 20(ssp brevirostris) Khao Yao NP; also on 16 March.

014. Germain's Swiftlet - Aerodramus germani

Regularly seen at roadsides at Pak Tale, Bangkok, Khao Yai NP and Khao Nor Chuchi.

015. Silver-rumped Spinetail - Rhaphidura leucopygialis

17 March c 5 U-trail area, Khao Nor Chuchi; also on 18 March.

016. Brown-backed Needletail - Hirundapus giganteus

Twice a flock of 3 birds at Khao Yai NP on 16 March.

017. Asian Palm Swift - Cypsiurus balasiensis

Regularly seen along roadsides in the whole country.

018. Cook's Swift - Apus cookii

12 March1(female) Ban Krang campground, Kaeng Krachan NP. First identified as a Little
Bronze Cuckoo C. minutillus, but photos showed it was a female Violet.



027. Banded Bay Cuckoo - Cacomantis sonneratii

Several heard at Kaeng Krachan NP on 12 and 13 March and in Khao Yai NP on 15 and 16 March. One came to drink at the blind at the Baan Song Nok resort on 14 March and was seen at very close range.

028. Plaintive Cuckoo - Cacomantis merulinus

18 March 1 A-trail, Khao Nor Chuchi.

029. Fork-tailed Drongo-Cuckoo - Surniculus dicruroides

Several heard at Kaeng Krachan NP on 12 and 13 March and in Khao Yai NP on 15 and 16 March.

030. Moustached Hawk-Cuckoo - Hierococcyx vagans

18 March 1 (very well seen) B-trail area, Khao Nor Chuchi.

We returned late afternoon for some more views when we found four birds at essentially the same saltpan. All were in full winter plumage, except one showed some streaks on the breast and few summer feathers on the mantle. Feeding behaviour is very distinctive.

063. Green Sandpiper - Tringa ochropus

11 March 1 at the sand spit of Laem Phak Bia when looking for White-faced Plover.

064. Common Redshank - Tringa tetanus

11 March c 50 in the saltpans at Pak Tale.

065. Marsh Sandpiper - Tringa stagnatilis

096. GREATER SPOTTED EAGLE - Clanga clanga

14 March1(adult) migrating north, halfway between Kaeng Krachan and Highway 4.This proved to be a new bird for our guide Tony!

Also, we learned a pair was hold territory at the Ban Krang campsite. Do not travel in darkness at the location mentioned <u>here</u>

unless you have a vehicle. There are elephants at night in the area and some could be lethal in the very near

future if birders decide their world-list is more important than their health!

One bird kept calling for more than half-an-hour, while another flew *under* me at the second bridge. It landed behind a tree trunk, only showing its tail. 190. Grey-eyed Bulbul - Iole propinqua

Fairly common at Khao Yai NP on 15 and 16 March, easily found by its mewing call.

191. Ashy Bulbul - Hemixos flavala

Common at Kaeng Krachan NP and Khao Yai NP. Interestingly, birds at Khao Yai have a red throat and chin (ssp *johnsoni*), whereas at Kaeng Krachan, the throat is black like the rest of the head.

220. Chestnut-winged Babbler - Cyanoderma erythropterum

259. Blue Rock Thrush - Monticola solitarius

A female in winter plumage of the *pandoo* ssp was seen at the summit restaurant of the Panoeng Tong Campsite, Kaeng Krachan NP on 13 March. The plumage of the female is very different in comparison to the European nominate. It is light blue-grey above with heavy scaling (not barring) on the mantle and breast in contrast to the all brown, unmarked upperparts and barred underparts of European Blue Rock-thrushes.

260. Amur Stonechat - Saxicola stejnegri

16 March 1 (male) open area south of HQ, Khao Yai NP. According to Ebird, Siberian Stonechat does not winter in Khao Yai, but only in Northern Thailand.

261. Blue-winged Leafbird - Chloropsis moluccensis

Commonly observed at Kaeng Krachan on 12 and 13 March and at Khao Yai NP on 15 and 16 March.

262. Golden-fronted Leafbird - Chloropsis aurifrons

14 March 1 (feeding on bananas) at the Baan Song Nok resort.

263. Yellow-breasted Flowerpecker - Prionochilus maculates

17 March 1 U-trail area, Khao Nor Chuchi.

264. Orange-bellied Flowerpecker - Dicaeum trigonostigma

A pair was daily observed just before my chalet in the Morakot Resort, Khao Nor Chuchi between 17 and 19 March, giving very close observations.

265. Cambodian Flowerpecker - Dicaeum cambodianum

15 March c 5 viewpoint at the military checkpoint, Khao Yai NP.

Fire-breasted Flowerpecker is split into three species, with Cambodian and Sumatran as new additions.

266. Scarlet-backed Flowerpecker - Dicaeum cruentatum

another endemic sunbird for the Philippines.

271. Ornate Sunbird - Cinnyris ornatus

272. Black-throated Sunbird - Aethopyga saturata

14 March 1 (female) in the forest along the trail to the summit of Kaeng Krachan NP.

273. Crimson Sunbird - Aethopyga siparaja

14 March 2 (males) at the start of the trail to the Tor Tip waterfall, Kaeng Krachan NP.

274. Little Spiderhunter - Arachnothera longirostra

The most common spiderhunter, observed daily in Kaeng Krachan, Khao Yai and Khao Nor Chuchi.

275. Thick-billed Spiderhunter - Arachnothera crassirostris

17 March 3 U-trail area, Khao Nor Chuchi.

276. Grey-breasted Spiderhunter - Arachnothera modesta

18 March 1-2 (heard only) A-trail area, Khao Nor Chuchi.

277. Streaked Spiderhunter - Arachnothera magna

13 March c 10 area around the Panoeng Tong Campsite, Kaeng Krachan NP.

278. Eurasian Tree Sparrow - Passer montanus

Common near human settlements, like House Sparrow in the good old days in Europe.

279. PLAIN-BACKED SPARROW - Passer flaveolus

14 March 10 behind the Phaiboon Appartments hotel, just outside Khao Yai NP.

280. Baya Weaver - Ploceus philippinus

14 March c 10 between Kaeng Krachan NP and Highway 4 to Bangkok.

281. Scaly-breasted Munia - Lonchura punctulata

- 14 March 1 seen from the blind at the Baan Song Nok resort.
- 18 March 6 Khlong Tom.

282. White-rumped Munia - Lonchura striata

14 March 2 seen from the blind at the Baan Song Nok resort.



283. PIN-TAILED PARROT-FINCH - Erythrura prasina*

13 March1-4(heard only) 1 km below the Panoeng Tong Campsite, Kaeng Krachan NP.Unfortunately, a heard-only by Arjan and Tony. We heard several birds in a large dead bamboo patch nearthe Kaeng Krachan summit only to be seen later on by Hans Matheve, the Belgian birder.

284. Forest Wagtail - Dendronanthus indicus

17 March 4 U-trail area, Khao Nor Chuchi.

285. Eastern Yellow Wagtail - Motacilla tschutschensis

11 March2in the saltpans of Pak Tale.

286. Grey Wagtail - Motacilla cinerea

12 March 1 Ban Krang campground, Kaeng Krachan NP; same bird on 13 March.

List of Mammals

Northern Treeshrew

One visiting the feeder at the Baan Song Nok hide.

White-handed Gibbon

Commonly heard at Kaeng Krachan NP and Khao Yai but unfortunately no views.

Dusky Langur

Common at Kaeng Krachan NP, including a female with an all-orange baby.

Tenasserim Langur

A very rare primate restricted to a tiny area in W-Thailand and Myanmar. We found two at the summit of Kaeng Krachan NP and later on a group of about 5 a km or so from the summit.

Pig-tailed Macaque

Several groups at KK and common at Khao Yai NP.

Long-tailed Macaque

Less common than the previous species and only seen at Kaeng Krachan NP.

Crab-eating Macaque

Jan encountered a group (or vice versa) in the Mangroves at Krabi.

Asian Elephant

Arjan's favourite animal in SE Asia was observed once when it crossed the road in Kaeng Krachan NP on 13 March.

Lesser Mousedeer

Arjan had prolonged views of one at the start of km 33 trail of Khao Yai NP.

Sambar

Common at Khao Yai NP.

Red Muntjac

One around the HQ at Khao Yai NP.

Small Asian Mongoose

One crossed the road on the drive out from Kaeng Krachan NP.

Black Giant Squirrel

This huge animal was found on several occasions at Kaeng Krachan NP and once at Khao Yai NP.

Variable Squirrel ssp folletti

Common at Khao Yai NP looking all grey and white below.

Pallas' Squirrel Several at Kaeng Krachan NP.

Indochinese Squirrel Several at Kaeng Krachan NP.

Western Striped Squirrel

This well-patterned squirrel was found at the feeders around the Baan Song Nok hides.
